

<p>a child or adult or to have subjected any person to serious injury as a result of intentional or grossly serious injury as a result of intentional or grossly negligent misconduct as evidenced by an oral or written statement to this effect obtained at the time of application;</p>		
<p>2. Participate in the orientation and training as stated in subparagraph (d) of this Rule; and</p>		
<p>3. Not have made any material false statements concerning qualifications requirements either to the department or the proposed licensee.</p>		
<p>4. All prospective foster parents, adoptive parents or any adult living in the foster or adoptive home must be checked against the child abuse and neglect registry for information, and must provide information from any other state in which any such prospective parent or other adult has resided in the previous 5 years to check any child abuse and neglect registry maintained by that state. Providers will need to comply with these requirements before they approve prospective homes when such information is available.</p>		
<p>(b) Human Services Professionals. The center shall have designated human service professionals to provide services to children and their families. There shall be one human services professional employed for every <del>separate residence</del> <sup>center</sup>. The center's director, if qualified by education, may perform the duties of a human services professional.</p>		
<p>1. Any human services professional employed shall either:</p>		
<p>(i) Possess a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university in social work, psychology, childhood education, education counseling and psychology, or a related field and either have two years experience in the field of child care or be supervised by another human service professional with a master's degree in one of the above disciplines; or</p>		
<p>(ii) Possess a master's degree from an accredited college or university in one of the above disciplines, or</p>
